Esperanza*

Esperanza was born into poverty, which caused her parents to do the unthinkable. They sold her as a teenage bride to a man she didn't know. When that man died, Esperanza found herself trafficked into a life of prostitution on the U.S. side of the border.

Though she eventually escaped, she was homeless until a caring woman took her in and helped her get back home to her children and family.

It was not long after that she happened to see one of her previous captors with a young girl in town. That chance sighting put Esperanza on a mission—a mission to rescue trafficked girls trapped just as she had been.

Yet her mission came with a price, a tragic one. When the men discovered she had rescued 11 girls, they broke into her home. They beat her, and they raped her. And when she didn't return the girls to them, they killed her son.

Despite her unfathomable grief and the many dangers she faces, Esperanza continues to fight sex trafficking. She is currently building a shelter for these girls. With some support from the

government, she is responsible for living expenses for both the girls and their newborn children, since many were pregnant when she took them in.

Esperanza is using her *Live Your Dream Awards* to pursue a degree in computer science and has been accepted into law school. Her long-term goal is defend victims of sex trafficking and bring to justice the men who profit at the women's expense.

She says, "My goals are many but I can summarize them all in one word: SERVING."

Sandra Rojas Fernandez

Life first began throwing challenges at Sandra Rojas Fernandez of Bolivia when she was just a baby. When she was 7 months old, her father passed away, leaving her young mother alone to care for Sandra and her three brothers. Times were hard and even the young children had to pitch in, washing clothes and cooking for other people.

When the children almost drowned washing clothes in the river, her mother sent them to live with relatives hoping they would have a better life. Unfortunately, for Sandra, that led to a childhood filled with neglect, physical abuse, and rape.

At 15 years old, Sandra got pregnant. She eventually married the father and they had three more children. But the cycle continued as her husband was an abusive alcoholic.

Though she was finally able to get a divorce and move on, her oldest son committed suicide because of depression.

And then, during all this emotional chaos, a dynamite explosion at a nearby mine destroyed her home and all her belongings. She lived in a tent with her children for some time.

Though she has endured incredible hardship, Sandra is determined to keep going and to improve her life and her children's lives, including a young grandson whom she supports.

At the age of 43, she is picking up the pieces and working to gain her high school diploma, with the help of her *Live Your Dream Awards*. Her ultimate dream is to study at the university in Orujo City and become a chef.

Terriea Wadud

Terriea Wadud is from Vancouver, Canada. Like many other indigenous people from that area, she was adopted at a very young age. Her adoptive mother physically and emotionally abused her until she was placed back into the child welfare system at the age of 12. The chaos in her life continued in group homes. She ran away and fell prey to the sex

trade in Ontario.

After a brutal beating by her pimp, she decided she was ready to press charges—as she had just learned she was pregnant with his child. At 16 years old, and 8 months pregnant, she testified against him and helped land him in jail.

When her daughter was born, Terriea vowed not to be anything like her adoptive mother. However, her traumatic past made being a

good mother very difficult. She turned to drugs and alcohol to numb her pain.

Then an opportunity presented itself to Terriea and became the first step in turning her life around. She completed a program called the Transitional Year at the University of Toronto and continued with a volunteer training program at Battered Women's Support Services, where she was eventually hired.

Just when things seemed to be getting on track, the program lost funding and Terriea was laid off. At the same time, she had a miscarriage and ended a three-year relationship. Not being able to afford rent on her own, she and her children became homeless.

Now staying with friends, she has accepted a temporary position with her previous employer, and is hopeful that it will lead to a full-time job.

Terriea is using her *Live Your Dream Awards* to pay for her tuition so that no matter what this next year throws at her, she won't have to put her

Program

Target Audience for Dream It, Be It

The target audience for Dream It, Be It: Career Support for Girls is girls in secondary school who face obstacles to their success. The program was designed for girls ages 14-18 based on extensive research about the needs of this specific age population. In order for Soroptimist to have increased collective impact and to understand how our global efforts improve the lives of girls, clubs should use the provided curriculum with girls who fit within the 14-18 year-old age range. When considering what group of 14-18 year-old girls to work with, clubs should target girls who encounter disadvantages to their success. These disadvantages may include: coming from a lowincome family, a single-parent household or an unstable home environment; not having access to adults who can help with postsecondary education options; or not having caregivers who are involved in school activities or who offer consistent support.

All Aboard the MemberSHIP Winners!

We are pleased to announce the 2015-2016 winners of the *All Aboard the MemberSHIP* campaign! The following clubs showed the greatest increases in recruiting new members during the first phase of the campaign and were recognized at the 44th Biennial Convention for their hard work. They each received \$500 USD to use for their *Live Your Dream Awards* recipients.

First Place: SI/Kwangjoomoojin, Korea Region (267 percent increase in new members!)

Second Place: SI/Elko, Nevada, Sierra Nevada Region (143 percent increase!)

Third Place (tie): SI/Kwangjoo Moodeung, Korea Region (77 percent increase!) and SI/The Greater Daytona Beach Area, Florida, Southern Region (77 percent increase!)

Fourth Place: SI/Jinjoo, Korea Region (64 percent increase!)

Fifth Place: SI/Northern Mariana Islands, Founder Region (58 percent increase!)

Also, one region was recognized for having the highest percentage of new and charter members—Korea Region! The region added a total of 250 new and charter members during the campaign period and received \$1,000 USD to provide an additional region-level 2016-2017 Live Your Dream Award or to support club Dream It, Be It activities in their region.

The Club Giving Effect

id you know that tiny bursts of wind created by a butterfly flapping its wings can have a big impact elsewhere on the planet? At Soroptimist headquarters, we see the Butterfly Effect every day. For example, last year SI/Anderson, Indiana, Midwestern Region, held a film festival fundraiser. Through a Club Giving contribution of at least 10 percent of the proceeds raised, their dollars traveled the globe like a gust of wind, helping women like Sandra in Bolivia. In addition to club and region awards, Sandra received one of the three \$10,000 finalist *Live Your Dream Awards*, made possible by contributions from clubs just like SI/Anderson.

The Butterfly Effect begins with one small flap of wings—the film festival in this case—and when combined with the efforts of the other 999 Soroptimist clubs that gave last year to Club Giving, lives are changed forever. Sandra's life—dominated by great perseverance in the face of abandonment and rape, a dynamite explosion and a son

who committed suicide—changed dramatically when she learned of her amazing windfall. Thanks in large part to the dedication of clubs like SI/Anderson that contribute at least 10 percent of their locally raised funds, hard-working Sandra is on her way to being a chef, and providing her family with the stability they need and deserve.

The women who bought their tickets to SI/Anderson's film festival had no idea who they were helping, but they knew their money was going to a good cause. That's the assurance Soroptimist can provide you—your Club Giving contributions of at least 10 percent will help a woman or girl who doesn't yet know how her life might change forever. Contributing at least 10 percent of your locally raised funds helps give wings to the dreams of women and girls, and give wings to our own dreams to serve even more women and girls through our Dream Programs. MEXICO/CENTROAMÉRICA REGION

In 2011, SI/Volcán, Panama, decided to hold workshops to provide life-skills training for women and girls in their local community. However, without a permanent location, the club faced obstacles preventing them from facilitating their programs. With the help of two Soroptimist Club Grants, donations from other Soroptimist clubs, and various fundraisers, members built a facility. Recently, the club held its first professional hair styling training, which attracted more than 20 participants. The new skills help women enhance their earning potential and support themselves and their families. Said member Ariadne H. de Berard, "A new world has been opened for them." The club plans to hold additional workshops in coming years.

PHILIPPINES REGION

After learning that teenage pregnancy rates are high in their local community, SI/Cordillera, Philippines, established

the Teenage Dating and Early Pregnancy Advocacy project. The club has held various events throughout the year, which educate girls about healthy relationships, sexually transmitted diseases and the effects of teenage pregnancy. Club President Asuncion Karen Labiaga, President-elect Elma de Guzman and member Jocelyn Crisostomo promoted the project on Naimbag Nga Morning Kapamilya—a live morning news and talk show program. The club has reached more than 150 students and plans to make this an ongoing project.
